



Marion J. "Bud" Heller

April 17, 1924 - November 24, 2015

Marion "Bud" Heller, age 91, passed away on Tuesday, November 24, 2015 at his home. He was born on April 17, 1924 in Marietta, a son of the late Ralph Heller and Edyth (Lemon) Heller. He was raised in Cambridge. He served in the U.S. Army during W.W. II. After being honorably discharged in 1945, Bud moved to Cleveland where he was a tool and die maker by trade. He later returned to Cambridge where he owned and operated City Tool and Die. After retiring he moved to Baton Rouge, LA, until 2004 when he returned to Cambridge.

Bud was also a professional photographer. When he wasn't taking pictures of family and friends, he could often be found cruising about Cambridge on his scooter taking pictures of scenery and flowers. In addition to taking photos, he often could be found in his workshop tinkering with watches, building model airplanes and learning new trades. Never brought down by his age, his sense of independence and freedom stayed with him till the very end.

He is preceded in death by: his parents, Ralph and Edyth Heller, both veterans of World War I; his brother Ralph (Chloe) Heller; the mother of his children Rhodena Dove; an infant granddaughter Sarah Steele.

Surviving are: his son Ted Heller of Cambridge; daughter Pam Steele of Cambridge; sister Martha Archer; granddaughter Beth Ann (Johnathan) Ferguson; grandson Nate Steele; special friend and caregiver Charlie Bender; numerous nieces and nephews; and his beloved cat Smokey.
