Word has been received that Richard Dale Long 91, formerly of Cambridge passed away Sept. 27 2011 in Tucson, Arizona following a lengthy illness. Dale was born in Old Washington, Ohio on Sept. 16, 1920 to George and Estella Long.

He was preceded in death by both parents, first wife Alice (Keates) and two sisters: Joan O'Neil and infant sister Cleva Long.

He is survived by his wife Ruth (Kynnersley of Tucson, Arizona, daughter Ellyn (Jim) MacConkey of Thousand Oaks, California, son Stephen (Joyce) Long of Tucson, Az., stepson Jeff (Christi) Kynnersley of Reynoldsberg, Ohio, sister Jean (Chuck) Milligan of Cambridge and brother Bill Long of Tallmadge, Ohio, six grandchildren, two step grandchildren, ten great grandchildren, one great stepchild, and one great, great grandchild.

Dale was a member of St Johns Episcopal Church in Cambridge and was a life member of the Cambridge Jaycees. He retired from Fabri-Form Co, in Byesville in 1988 after 28 years as a cost estimator in the engineering dept . He was a World War II Veteran serving in the 8th Army Air Corp, 100th Bomb Group in England. On his 22nd mission his plane and crew were shot down and taken prisoners in Germany. He was a recipient of the Purple Heart and a lifetime member of the Cambridge Chapter for America's Order of the Purple Heart . He was also a life member of the Guernsey Chapter #28 Disabled American Veterans as well as , a member of Post #84 of the American Legion. Dale was past Grand Commander of the Ohio Knights Templar and 33rd

degree Mason. He was a 50 year plus member of the Guernsey Lodge No.632 and he was also a Cambridge OES member.
